Greetings! Welcome to the Master of Data Science in Health (MDSH) program at the UCLA Fielding School of Public Health. We are delighted that you're committed to a graduate, professional degree in the intersection of data science and public health.



Data-intensive research and the development of analytic tools in the health sciences continue to witness an explosion of interest largely attributable to rapid developments in high-performance computing, statistical methods and new programming environments. Technological advances have produced massive databases on a variety of health outcomes that are accessible to health science administrators, researchers, and policymakers. This data deluge ("BIG DATA") poses new challenges in training the next generation of data scientists who will be tasked with analyzing massive databases in the broader health sciences.

In this era of big data technologies, massive electronically stored digital databases carry information on a variety of health-related issues. Statistical modeling and analysis of such data will provide invaluable insights into the various processes and attributes of such data with the potential to generate new scientific discoveries, shape new health policies, and develop new

practices to improve our quality of life. As these databases become increasingly accessible to data scientists, the demand for individuals with the skills to harness emerging technologies and statistical methods to tap into these treasure troves is soaring in hospitals, universities, research organizations, and the pharmaceutical and biotechnology industries, among others.

The UCLA Fielding School of Public Health launched the Master of Data Science in Health (MDSH) degree program in fall of 2023 to help meet this growing demand. This program has been tailored to meet the demands of the dynamic and complex health industry by preparing students to be leaders in the field of health data science. The program is designed to appeal to current working professionals seeking to obtain the skills to thrive in a data-rich environment as well as to recent college graduates looking to build a career in the burgeoning field. The curriculum primarily focuses on developing practical problem-solving skills that are needed for those eyeing a career in data science within the health sector. Each course will incorporate massive data sets that course participants will work with as they develop skills in data engineering, data visualization, mining and exploring of data, machine learning methods, and statistical design of research studies. The MDSH degree will require a capstone project through which students apply the data science tools they have learned to explore and solve contemporary problems in the broader health sciences and public health.


Program Logistics

Degree requirements

To graduate, the MDSH program requires students to complete 8 core courses and 4 elective courses, totaling 48 units. The minimal time to complete: 6 quarters over two academic years. The Course Schedule can be found here: https://mdsh.ucla.edu/curriculum/classschedule/

Communications

Students are expected to regularly check email and Slack for MDSH communications including weekend reminders and program updates.

Classrooms

All of the Year 1 MDSH in-person classes will be held in lecture halls CHS 43-105 or 33-105 unless otherwise noted. Updates on the specific classrooms will be provided prior to the weekend sessions via email and Slack.

Refreshments

There is a rolling cart designated for the MDSH cohort, equipped with a basic coffee and tea, snacks, and supplies. During Orientation, you will be given a MDSH reusable tumbler. Please bring your MDSH tumbler with you to class to enjoy coffee or tea. Note that the program only provides plates, cups, utensils, etc. for meals provided by the program.

Meals

Each class weekend will provide at least one meal (breakfast or lunch). You will be informed ahead of time via email and Slack. Students are responsible for other meals and may bring their own food and drinks (microwaves and vending machines are available on the first floor of CHS just outside the D Elevators) or purchase from a local eatery. In most eateries on campus, if you show your BruinCard or tell them that you are a student, you will not have to pay sales tax. See "Campus Services & Resources" section below for restaurant and convenience store options. Note that some campus restaurants are closed on weekends.

Registration & Tuition

Admission, Registration & Enrollment

Each applicant admitted to a graduate program at UCLA receives an online official offer letter of admission containing their UCLA ID (UID) number, a link to the online Statement of Intention to Register (SIR), and a Statement of Legal Residence.

Once these are submitted online, the admitted applicant is entered in the Registrar's database through MyUCLA. If a final transcript, degree diploma, or other documentation confirming the undergraduate degree was requested on the checklist accompanying the admission letter, it must be delivered to the Fielding School of Public Health Student Affairs Office through email (admissions@ph.ucla.edu) or via mail (see below) as soon as possible to ensure continuing registration and enrollment as a graduate student at UCLA.

Registration consists of paying fees and enrolling in classes. Registration fees and other University charges are paid through BruinBill. BruinBill is an electronic bill (eBill) that students can view in MyUCLA. After enrollment is processed, study lists may be viewed in MyUCLA.

Enrollment times determine when you can enroll in classes for the next quarter. You can find your enrollment appointment on your Study List page. Reminders to enroll will also be sent out via email once enrollment appointments open; however, it is your responsibility to ensure you enroll in classes in a timely manner. Delaying enrollment can cause you to miss important class announcements, receive additional enrollment restrictions, and result in additional fees.

Here are the steps to enroll in a class:

- Log in to MyUCLA https://my.ucla.edu/
- Select "Classes," then under "Plan and Enroll," select "Class Planner"
- From this screen, under the search, put in "Biostatistics" for Enter Subject Area. You should be able to select your class in the box below.
- Click the white box under Select Lecture 80 (80 is used for all MDSH classes), then add class to plan.
- Click the pencil under Change, and select Enroll (on the right side).

Graduate students must be either registered and enrolled or on an official leave of absence every term until their degrees are awarded. As an exception, certain graduate students may be eligible to pay the filing fee. Failure to register or be on an official leave of absence for any term constitutes withdrawal from UCLA. Students who wish to discuss a leave of absence or filing fee need to speak with the program for more information.

MyUCLA

MyUCLA gives UCLA students, and those who have been students within the past 10 years, real-time access to their university academic, personal, and financial records. Access is based on students' UCLA username/password.

Contact Information

Any changes to your personal contact information (i.e. primary email address, mailing address, phone number) must be changed through MyUCLA. This method will update your information university-wide. You must also notify the MDSH Program Office separately. Please email mdsh@ucla.edu when you make personal information changes on MyUCLA.

Tuition/Paying Registration Fees

For the 2024 entering cohort, MDSH tuition is \$1,250 per unit, or \$30,000 for the academic year. Tuition covers the cost of registration and enrollment. Tuition can be paid in three payments during each academic year. Students may review their BruinBill account at any time through MyUCLA and make payments by University deadlines. These online payments may include BruinPay Plan, eCheck, MasterCard, Discover or American Express (with a 2.75% base transaction). Payments by cash can only be made in-person at the Administrative Main Cashier Office (1125 Murphy Hall) at their customer service windows.

BruinBill

UCLA uses a readily accessible financial system, known as BruinBill, to assist students in managing their account and to generate fellowship stipend, loan, and other need- and merit-based aid payments. The University records all billing (such as tuition, non-resident supplemental tuition, and Student Health Services charges) and all UCLA aid payments through the BruinBill system. Each month, students need to review transactions posted to their BruinBill account using MyUCLA.

With BruinBill, aid funds (including ASE and RA fee remissions, fellowships, training grant payments, loans, and other awards) will automatically apply towards the payment of fee and tuition bills. For students who have a fellowship package from their department or the Graduate Division that fully covers fees and tuition, these charges will be automatically paid through BruinBill. Any remaining funds after their bills have been paid will be disbursed as a credit refund through BruinDirect.

BruinDirect: Electronic Deposit of Funds

Students who have not signed up for BruinDirect will have all refund checks mailed to them and will likely experience a delay of several days in receiving their checks. If you have applied for Financial Aid, we highly recommend you sign up for BruinDirect to assure you receive any refund owed to you as quickly as possible. Sign up for BruinDirect through MyUCLA:

- 2. Sign in and click on BruinBill (under the Finances and Jobs section)

Financial Support

Financial Aid

Students may qualify for federal student loans by completing the FAFSA, which is available on the <u>UCLA Financial Aid website</u>. Applications are accepted even after the deadline. Financial aid notices are issued mid-July and continue throughout the academic year. Funding based on financial need is available to U.S. citizens and permanent residents and includes loans and work-study awards. Ensure all required documents are submitted before the start of the quarter. Aid is disbursed about a week before the first class weekend. Non-eligible students may borrow up to \$4,000 through alternative means. For more information, visit <u>UCLA Financial Aid</u> or call (310) 206-0400.

MDSH Scholarships

The MDSH Program offers annual scholarships equivalent to half of tuition to MDSH students based on merit, diversity, and need. Applications will become available during the Spring quarter for the following academic year. For incoming MDSH students awarded a scholarship, the scholarship continues in the second-year contingent upon satisfactory degree progress. A limited number of scholarships will be awarded to second-year students. The scholarship is paid in the form of tuition credit in BruinBill, distributed equally each quarter.

Letters of Recommendation

As students identify future career opportunities, they may find themselves in need of letters of recommendation. Faculty can serve as potential resources.

To allow a faculty member to consider writing a letter of support on your behalf, they require evidence of your skills as realized by your course participation and engagement and your past and future interests and goals. Your initiative in cultivating relationships with your faculty to explore career and professional development will allow them further insight into your strengths. A minimum of one month should be allowed for adequate time to compose a well-crafted letter on your behalf.

Professional Societies

We highly encourage students to take advantage of student membership in professional societies. They offer student membership at very low prices or even free. Membership offers free subscriptions to journals and substantial discounts to attend conferences, which are great venues for extending your professional network.

- American Statistical Association (ASA) When joining ASA, you can choose one or more local
 chapters, so you don't miss any local events including career fairs. Many students use the Joint
 Statistical Meeting (JSM) career services to find jobs. Student membership \$30.
- American Public Health Association (APHA) serves as a convenor, catalyst and advocate to build capacity in the public health community. <u>Student membership</u> \$90.
- **Institute of Mathematical Statistics (IMS)** is an international organization representing wideranging interests in statistical research. <u>Student membership</u> is free.
- International Chinese Statistical Association (ICSA) holds a special JSM (Joint Statistical Meeting) partnership. Student membership is free.

Program Expectations & Policies

MDSH Courses

Students will start the program together and move through each quarter as a cohort. The MDSH is a two-year, 48-unit program, consisting of a public health foundation course (4 units), MDSH core courses (24 units), MDSH electives (16 units), and a data science capstone course (4 units). MDSH students typically take 2 courses per quarter and complete the program in 6 academic quarters (20 months).

Only classes taken for a letter grade will count towards MDSH requirements. Classes taken satisfactory/unsatisfactory (S/U) will not count towards MDSH requirements and will result in having to repeat the course(s).

Mixed Enrollment (Non MDSH-Courses)

Mixed enrollment refers to taking courses outside of the MDSH program. This may be within the Biostatistics Department or in another department. The cost of these classes is \$1250/unit and is not included in the MDSH tuition. Mixed enrollment courses do not count towards MDSH graduation. Students must be in good academic standing to take courses outside of the MDSH program.

UCLA Academic Integrity

Standard of Scholarship

UCLA requires at least a B (3.0) grade point average for all graduate courses to be applied toward advanced degrees. A student is considered in probationary status and subject to dismissal if the cumulative scholarship in all work attempted falls below a 3.0 or if the student's work in any two consecutive terms falls below a 3.0 Average. If allowed to continue in probationary status, the student is required to make expeditious progress toward improvement in scholarship through development of an academic progress contract supported by the student's Academic Advisor. The Associate Dean of Student Affairs must then support a student's appeal to continue graduate study.

Incompletes

The instructor assigns the grade "I" when a student's work is of passing quality but is incomplete for good cause. A student may remove the "I" and receive unit credit and grade points by satisfactorily completing the course work consistent with a plan specified with the instructor. If the work is not completed by the end of the next quarter of residence, the "I" grade will automatically be replaced with the grade of "F" (1.0). If

an "I" grade has lapsed to an "F," the student may be able to complete the course in a subsequent quarter with the permission of the instructor and receive the appropriately earned grade assigned. Until that time, the "F" grade appears on the record and 1.0 is calculated in the grade point average. Dropping / Waiving a class

MDSH is a cohort program and as such, classes are fixed. In the event that a student anticipates the need to drop a course, the student must first discuss with the SAO and Program Director.

Students who have a degree from a CEPH-accredited public health school or program are waived from Public Health C201 but must take an additional elective from the program's approved list to reach the 48 units required for the program. Work with the SAO and Program Director if you would like to waive out of C201.

Academic Behavior

On average, taking two courses per quarter, MDSH students spend 16 hours per week on course preparation and assignments in addition to 4 hours of lecture per week per class. Each faculty will thoroughly explain their objectives and requirements. Students are expected to conform to the UCLA culture and guidelines to create a positive learning environment, including:

- Completing all reading, preparation, and assignments in a comprehensive and thorough manner prior to class
- Reviewing and complying with assignment instructions
- Submitting assignments on time
- Actively participating and engaging during class discussion and group assignments
- Attending all class sessions (in-person and online)
- Collaborating with fellow students
- Respecting instructors and fellow students

BruinCard

BruinCard is a multi-purpose card that serves as your official UCLA student ID, library card, and entry key into the Fielding School of Public Health during class weekends and can be used as a pre-paid debit card for purchases on and off campus. All MDSH students are required to have a BruinCard.

You must apply for your BruinCard by August 31, 2024. Submit your photo for your BruinCard (requirements here: https://bruincard.ucla.edu/submit-photo). The MDSH program will pick up the BruinCard for you and distribute to you during the MDSH Orientation.
