Welcome to the Master of Data Science in Health (MDSH) program at the UCLA Fielding School of Public Health. We are delighted that you're committed to a graduate, professional degree at the intersection of data science and health.



The health sciences are experiencing rapid growth in data-intensive research, fueled by advances in high-performance computing, statistical methods, and programming tools. These technological shifts have generated massive health databases accessible to researchers, administrators, and policymakers.

This data deluge ("BIG DATA") brings both opportunities and challenges. Skilled data scientists are needed to transform these vast datasets into insights that drive scientific discovery, shape health policy, and improve care.

In this era of big data technologies, massive electronically stored digital databases carry information on a variety of health-related issues. The Master of Data Science in Health (MDSH) program is tailored to meet the demands of the dynamic and complex health industry by preparing you to be leaders in the field of health data science. The program appeals to professionals enhancing their data skills and recent graduates launching careers in this expanding field. Each course incorporates massive data sets you will work with to develop skills in data engineering, data visualization, mining and exploring of data, machine learning methods, statistical design of research studies and practical problem solving. The academic experience culminates in a Capstone project in which student teams are paired with leading industry partners to solve real-world business and public/health problems.

Our graduates go on to become research data analysts, data scientists, statistical programmers, biostatisticians, and machine learning engineers in hospitals and health systems, public health agencies, biotech and pharma, banks, tech companies, and digital health startups—leading initiatives that improve patient outcomes, accelerate research, and shape data-driven policy—and some continue into PhD programs across diverse fields such as cognitive science, computer science, epidemiology, finance, public health, and primary health care.

- Password is your BOL password.

If "eduroam" gives you a hard time, FSPH also has a "medguest" WIFI, which will take you to a secure single sign-on webpage. You will sign in using your BOL username and password.

Program Logistics and Expectations

Degree requirements

Students will start the program together and move through each quarter as a cohort. The MDSH degree program requires 12 4-unit MDSH courses, including one capstone project. It takes a minimum of 20 months (6 academic quarters) to complete.

Required courses are:

- Public Health C201
- Biostatistics 203A, 203B, 203C, 201A, 212A, 212B, and 401.
- 16 units from the following MDSH program electives: Biostatistics 213-218, 230-241, 273-280, 285, and 410-414.
- Students who have a degree from a CEPH-accredited public health school or program can apply to waive out of Public Health C201 but must take an additional elective from the program's approved list to reach the 48 units required for the program. Students who wish to waive Public Health C201 must reach out to mdsh@ucla.edu.

Only courses in which a grade of C or better is received may be applied toward the requirements for a master's degree. **Courses taken for S/U (Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory) grading may not be applied toward the degree requirements.** Students must maintain an overall average of no less than 3.0 (B) in all courses required or elected during their graduate education at the University of California.

Course Workload and Classroom Expectations

On average, taking the required two MDSH courses per quarter, students spend 16 hours on course preparation and assignments and 8 hours of lecture per week. Each instructor will thoroughly explain course objectives and requirements. Students are expected to conform to the UCLA culture and guidelines to create a positive learning environment, including:

- Completing all reading, preparation, and assignments in a comprehensive and thorough manner prior to class
- Reviewing and complying with assignment instructions
- Submitting assignments on time
- Actively participating and engaging during class discussion and group assignments
- Attending all class sessions (in-person and online)
- Collaborating with fellow students
- Respecting instructors and fellow students

Communication Standards/Expectations

Students are expected to regularly check email and Slack for MDSH communications including weekend reminders and program updates. A few days before each in-person class weekend, an email will be sent with classroom assignments, details about the lunch being provided that weekend, and other reminders and announcements.

Code of Conduct

Standard of Scholarship

UCLA requires at least a B (3.0) grade point average for all graduate courses to be applied toward advanced degrees. A student is considered in probationary status and subject to dismissal if the cumulative coursework GPA falls below a 3.0 or if the student's work in any two consecutive terms falls below a 3.0 average. If allowed to continue in probationary status, the student is required to make expeditious progress toward improvement in scholarship through development of an academic progress contract supported by the student's Academic Advisor. The Associate Dean of Student Affairs must then support a student's appeal to continue graduate study.

Incompletes

The instructor assigns the grade "I" when a student's work is of passing quality but is incomplete for good cause. A student may remove the "I" and receive unit credit and grade points by satisfactorily completing the course work consistent with a plan specified with the instructor. If the work is not completed by the end of the next quarter of residence, the "I" grade will automatically be replaced with the failing grade of "F". If an "I" grade has lapsed to an "F," the student may be able to complete the course in a subsequent quarter with the permission of the instructor and receive the appropriately earned grade assigned. Until that time, the "F" grade appears on the record and 1.0 is calculated in the grade point average. For detailed information, please refer to the Standards and Procedures for Graduate Study:

Dropping / Waiving a class

MDSH is a cohort program and as such, classes are fixed (see [Degree Requirements](#) above). In the event that a student anticipates the need to drop a course, the student must first discuss with the SAO and Program Director by emailing mdsh@ucla.edu. If a student intends to waive a course due to previously taking the same course as an undergraduate student at UCLA or intends to waive [Public Health C201](#), the student must email mdsh@ucla.edu before fall quarter of the second year.

Program Concerns and Evaluations

The MDSH team values your input and is committed to continuous improvement. Each quarter, students are expected to participate in surveys (15–25 minutes) to share feedback on courses and programming. You may also email mdsh@ucla.edu anytime with questions, concerns, or suggestions.

Class Weekends and Expectations

Attendance

Attendance at every in-person class weekend and weekday Zoom lecture is mandatory. In the rare occasion that an absence is unavoidable, you are expected **to reach out to your instructors and TAs** in a timely manner to inform them, inquire about making up classwork, and how this may affect your grade.

Classrooms

All MDSH in-person classes will be held in lecture halls within the Center for Health Sciences (CHS) building. Classroom assignments can be found on the [class schedule](#) (subject to change). Updates on the specific classrooms will be provided prior to the weekend sessions via email.

Refreshments

There is a rolling cart placed in/outside of MDSH classrooms, designated for the MDSH cohort, equipped with a basic coffee and tea, snacks, and supplies. During Orientation, you will be given a MDSH reusable tumbler. Using your MDSH tumbler helps us reduce single-use waste. Note that the program only provides plates, cups, utensils, etc. for meals provided by the program.

Meals

Lunch will be provided once each class weekend either on Saturday or Sunday. Students are responsible for other meals and may bring their own food and drinks (microwaves and vending machines are available on the first floor of CHS just outside the D Elevators) or purchase from a local eatery. In most eateries on campus, if you show your BruinCard, you will not have to pay sales tax. See “[Campus Services & Resources](#)” section below for restaurant and convenience store options. Note that some campus restaurants are closed on weekends.

Graduate Reading Room

The Graduate Reading Room is a 24-hour study space for graduate students in the Schools of Dentistry, Medicine, Nursing and Public Health, as well as in the life sciences division of the College. The Graduate Reading Room is accessible from the 8th stack level of the Louise M. Darling Biomedical Library during regular hours. Eligible users may access the reading room after hours via BruinCard swipe at CHS 32-001 (right around the corner from CHS 33-105, a classroom often used for MDSH weekend classes). Enrollment, Registration, and Tuition

Admission, Registration & Enrollment

Each applicant admitted to a graduate program at UCLA receives an online official offer letter of admission containing their UCLA ID (UID) number, a link to the online Statement of Intention to Register (SIR), and a Statement of Legal Residence.

Once these are submitted online, the admitted applicant is entered in the Registrar’s database through MyUCLA. If a final transcript, degree diploma, or other documentation confirming the undergraduate degree was requested on the checklist accompanying the admission letter, it must be delivered to the Fielding School of Public Health Student Affairs Office through email (admissions@ph.ucla.edu) (preferred) or via mail (see below) as soon as possible to ensure continuing registration and enrollment as a graduate student at UCLA.

Registration consists of paying fees and enrolling in classes. Registration fees and other University charges are paid through BruinBill. BruinBill is an electronic bill (eBill) that students can view in MyUCLA. After enrollment is processed, study lists (enrolled courses) may be viewed in MyUCLA.

Enrollment times determine when you can enroll in classes for the *next* quarter. You can find your enrollment appointment on your Study List page. Reminders to enroll will also be sent out via email once

enrollment appointments open, however, **it is your responsibility to ensure you enroll in classes in a timely manner.** Delaying enrollment can cause you to miss important class announcements, receive additional enrollment restrictions, and result in additional fees.

Steps to enroll in a class:

- Log in to MyUCLA <https://my.ucla.edu/>
- Select “Classes,” then under “Plan and Enroll,” select “Class Planner”
- From this screen, under the search, put in “Biostatistics” for “Enter Subject Area.” You should be able to select your class in the box below.
- Click the white box under Select the Lecture (80 and 82 are used for all MDSH classes), then add class to plan.
- Click the pencil under “Change,” and select “Enroll” (on the right side).
- Make sure your default grading scheme is **Letter Grading (LG)** for courses. Courses taken with S/U (Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory) grading will **NOT** count towards course requirements.

Graduate students must be either registered and enrolled or on an official leave of absence every term until their degrees are awarded. As an exception, certain graduate students may be eligible to pay the filing fee. Failure to register or be on an official leave of absence for any term constitutes withdrawal from UCLA. Students who wish to discuss a leave of absence or filing fee need to email the MDSH program at mdsh@ucla.edu for more information.

MyUCLA

MyUCLA gives UCLA students, and those who have been students within the past 10 years, real-time access to their university academic, personal, and financial records. Access is based on students’ UCLA username/password.

Contact Information

Any changes to your personal contact information (i.e. primary email address, mailing address, phone number) must be changed through MyUCLA. This method will update your information university-wide. You must also notify the MDSH program separately at mdsh@ucla.edu.

Note: Your name will appear on your diploma as your lived name on MyUCLA, please ensure this information is accurate by January 1st of the year you will graduate.

Tuition/Paying Registration Fees

For the Class of 2026 and 2027, MDSH tuition is \$1,250 per unit, or \$30,000 for each academic year. Tuition covers the cost of registration and enrollment. Tuition can be paid in three payments during each academic year. Students may review their BruinBill account at any time through MyUCLA and make payments by University deadlines. These online payments may include BruinPay Plan, eCheck, MasterCard, Discover or American Express (with a 2.75% base transaction). Payments by cash can only be made in-person at the Administrative Main Cashier Office (1125 Murphy Hall) at their customer service windows.

BruinPay Plan (BPP)

Eligible students can enroll in BruinPay Plan (BPP) to pay their term fees in three monthly installments. Enrollment deadlines and more information about BPP can be found [here](#).

BruinBill

UCLA uses a readily accessible financial system, known as BruinBill, to assist students in managing their account and to generate fellowship stipend, loan, and other need- and merit-based aid payments. The University records all billing (such as tuition, non-resident supplemental tuition, and Student Health Services charges) and all UCLA aid payments through the BruinBill system. Each month, students need to review transactions posted to their BruinBill account using MyUCLA.

With BruinBill, aid funds (including Academic Student Employee (ASE) and Graduate Student Research (GSR) fee remissions, fellowships, training grant payments, loans, and other awards) will automatically apply towards the payment of fee and tuition bills. For students who have a fellowship package from their department or the Graduate Division that fully covers fees and tuition, these charges will be automatically paid through BruinBill. Any remaining funds after bills have been paid will be disbursed as a credit refund through BruinDirect.

BruinDirect: Electronic Deposit of Funds

We highly recommend you sign up for BruinDirect to assure you receive any refund owed to you as quickly as possible. Sign up for BruinDirect through MyUCLA:

1. Go to my.ucla.edu
2. Sign in and click on BruinBill (under the Finances and Jobs section)
3. Click "Continue to BruinBill"
4. Click on the link at the bottom of the page that reads "Sign up for My BruinDirect"

Students who have not signed up for BruinDirect will have all refund checks mailed to them and will likely experience a delay of several days in receiving their checks.

Financial Support

Scholarships and fellowships are also extremely limited this year due to the current federal administration's restrictions on funding. Review [this page](#) for possible employment opportunities on-campus.

Financial Aid

Students may qualify for federal student loans by completing the FAFSA, which is available on the [UCLA Financial Aid website](#). Applications are accepted even after the deadline. Financial aid notices are issued mid-July and continue throughout the academic year. Funding based on financial need is available to U.S. citizens and permanent residents and includes loans and work-study awards. Ensure all required documents are submitted before the start of the quarter. Aid is disbursed about a week before the first class weekend.

MDSH Scholarships

The MDSH Program offers annual scholarships in varying tuition amounts to MDSH students based on merit, diversity, need, and community engagement. The scholarship amount each year is subject to change in accordance with funding availability that year. Applications will become available during the Spring quarter for the following academic year. First year students not already awarded a scholarship may apply for a scholarship for their second year. The scholarship is paid in the form of tuition credit in BruinBill, distributed equally each quarter.

On-campus Employment

You can sign up for the ASE/GSR marketplace [HERE](#) to look for and apply to positions once Fall quarter of your first year begins. If you do receive a TA or GSR offer, you must inform the MDSH program office at mdsh@ucla.edu. Please note these positions are extremely limited, and are generally held by second year students.

Academic Advisor

Students will be assigned an academic advisor who is a faculty member of the Department of Biostatistics. Faculty advisors serve to help you develop and update an individualized plan of study, interpret program requirements and policies, monitor progress toward degree completion, recommend electives aligned with your goals, and connect you with research, capstone, internship, and campus resources. Students are encouraged to meet with their academic advisor quarterly. In addition to your formal academic advisor, faculty may be willing to serve as informal advisors and are excellent resources for career and competency development.

To write a strong letter, a faculty member needs to know your skills, interests, and goals, as shown through your participation in class and your engagement with the course. Building relationships with your faculty instructors, academic advisors and program director will give them better insight into your strengths and professional development.

Please allow at least one month for them to prepare a well-written letter on your behalf.
